Understanding Social Distancing

Social distancing is something that is introduced by a government. It includes asking people to do things that can help to stop a virus from spreading quickly from person to person.

Social distancing might include:

- staying at home as much as possible;
- only meeting people outside and at a safe distance;
- · avoiding going inside other people's homes.

What Might Social Distancing Look Like?

Social distancing might mean that some normal activities look a bit different. This is because social distancing often asks people to stay a safe distance away from others who don't live in the same home as them.

These stories are from children who are socially distancing.

Myra and Jagrati are sisters. They've noticed that a few things have changed at home. Usually, their house is busy with people but they've not had many visitors recently. As they've not been able to see their grandparents in person for a while, they have been chatting with them on video calls. Last week, they even put on a play that they had written themselves. Everyone found it really funny! Although they miss seeing their grandparents in person, they know that staying at a distance is helping to keep everyone safe.

Understanding Social Distancing


Social distancing is an idea that is introduced by a government. It includes asking people to do things that can help to slow the spread of a virus. Viruses are a type of germ and they can spread between people. Social distancing helps people to stay at a safe distance from one another so that the virus is less likely to spread.

When introducing social distancing measures, a government might ask people to:

- stay at home as much as possible;
- only meet people outside while keeping a safe distance apart;
- avoid going into other people's homes.

What Might Social Distancing Look like at Home?

If social distancing is happening, you might have fewer visitors to your home than normal. This is because social distancing often suggests that people who don't live together should stay apart as much as possible. If people do visit your home, they might only stay in the garden and not come inside.






What Might Social Distancing Look like at School?

At school, social distancing might mean that there are fewer people in your class with you. At breaktime and lunchtime, you could be asked to keep a safe distance from others and there might be a one-way system in place around the building.


